
Disney's The Little Mermaid

Venn Diagram Activity: Compare and Contrast

In the story of The Little Mermaid, Ariel dreams of a chance to become human. She is fascinated with people and their world above the surface. Ariel begins to collect human objects that she finds in the ocean, such as a fork and a pipe.

Even though Ariel believes that life on land will be completely different to life under the sea, she soon finds out that many things - like the love of her friends and family - are the same no matter where you are from!



Answer the following questions to begin the Venn Diagram Activity:




- What do you think life is like as a mermaid like Ariel?
- What is unique about life under the sea?
 - What is unique about living on land?
- What differences can you point out between the human world and Ariel's world under the sea?
- What similarities can you think of that might exist between the human world and Ariel's world?



Complete the Venn Diagram below:

- On the left side of the Venn Diagram, write down descriptions of the Human world above the surface of the ocean. Think of all the things that exist on land!
- On the right side of the Venn Diagram, write down descriptions of Ariel's world below the surface of the ocean. Think of all the creatures under the sea!
- In the center, write down the similarities that exist between the two worlds.





Craft Activity: Popsicle Stick Mermaid Tails


Complete this fun activity from the blog *Glued To My Crafts* to create and customize your very own mermaid tail!

Craft Supplies:

- Jumbo Popsicle Sticks (3 per mermaid tail)
- School Glue or Glue Stick
- Foam Paint Brush
- Basic Craft Scissors
- Green Cardstock or Construction Paper
- Green Craft Paint
- Small Paper Plate
- Gold Glitter Glue
- optional more glitter, rhinestones etc.


Directions:

- Grab three popsicle sticks for each mermaid tail.
- Paint or color the popsicle sticks green.
- Using one small drop of glue for each corner, glue the popsicle sticks together in the shape of a triangle.
- Set aside to let the glue dry completely. Repeat for each mermaid tail you want to make.
- Grab your green cardstock or construction paper and cut out a triangular shape that will be placed within the triangle formed by the popsicle sticks.
- Cut out two fins to complete the mermaid tail.
- Glue the paper triangle to the back of the popsicle sticks.
- Glue the fins on to the front bottom corner of the popsicle sticks.
- Add any additional decorations.
- Set your Mermaid Tail aside to let it dry completely before displaying!
